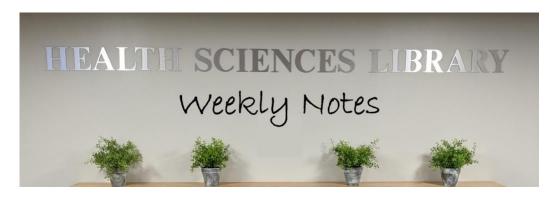

Resource Spotlight



PubMed is a free resource supporting the search and retrieval of biomedical and life sciences literature with the aim of improving health–both globally and personally.

The PubMed database contains more than 30 million citations and abstracts of biomedical literature. It does not include full-text journal articles; however, links to the full text are often present when available from other sources, such as the publisher's website, PubMed Central (PMC) or University Library subscriptions.

Available to the public online since 1996, PubMed was developed and is maintained by the National Center for Biotechnology Information (NCBI), at the U.S. National Library of Medicine (NLM), located at the National Institutes of Health (NIH).

It is a highly recommended source for searching health sciences and medical research literature.

Check out PubMed's tutorials and search strategies - or ask a librarian for guidance!

Do you use PubMed with an NCBI account?

NCBI - the National Center for Biotechnology Information - is the platform on which PubMed & some other medical databases sit. If you use an **NCBI account** to log into PubMed to save your search filters and search results and alerts, make note that changes are on the horizon for account log-in.
